WHOSE HAT IS THAT?

Fascinating, bizarre and unusual Lodge traditions

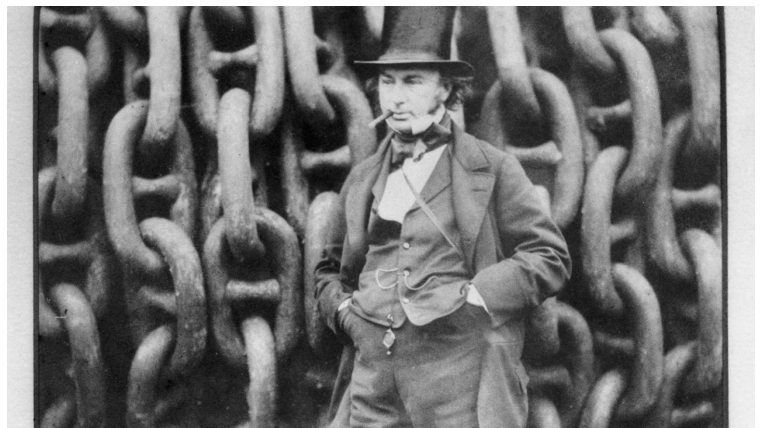


One of the joys of Freemasonry is visiting other lodges and witnessing some fascinating or even bizarre elements that reflect the lodge's specific interests. Some such as those with military or regional characteristics perhaps have rituals that might not be unexpected but others may be obscure to those 'not in the know'.

Take **Permanent Way Lodge no. 9951** – one of the newest in the Province. At its meetings, the Master enters the lodge wearing an unusually tall top hat and, after some railway-related exchanges, the hat is reverently placed on a reserved seat ('permanent way' incidentally, referring to the track and formation of a railway line, as this is a railway lodge).

So, whose hat is it? A clue might be taken from the hat's maker – Locks – the firm that happened to make one of history's most distinctive 'stovepipe' top hats: that worn by Isambard Kingdom Brunel.

Brunel of course, was 'one of the most ingenious and prolific figures in engineering history' of the Victorian age who went on to create the Great Western Railway; steamships (including the first propeller-driven transatlantic vessel); bridges, tunnels and many other pioneering engineering and civil engineering firsts. He was short in stature, his extra-tall hat (in fact a popular style of the age) giving the great man greater public prominence.



It is perhaps the Great Western Railway – with its broad 7ft. 0.25in. gauge carrying the fastest trains in the world – with which he is most associated.

Brunel was a Freemason, initiated into a lodge of the Grand Orient in France by his French father Marc. He was later accepted into English Freemasonry after the family moved to England.

Many of Brunel's colleagues were Freemasons also, in particular Daniel (later Sir Daniel) Gooch, Brunel's talented locomotive engineer. Gooch became a prominent Freemason, going on to become Deputy Provincial Grand Master of Wiltshire and Provincial Grand Master for both Berkshire and Buckinghamshire. Gooch was a petitioner for Gooch Lodge no. 1295 in Swindon (which still exists) and, interestingly, production of a Summons would entitle the Brother to discounted train travel.

Hence, this splendid hat is recognition of the part that Brunel and his close friend, colleague and Brother, played in developing Freemasonry along the route of the Great Western Railway and particularly in Swindon, which became the engineering centre of the GWR. Gooch was for two years Master of Royal Sussex Lodge of Emulation no. 355, which met on the first floor of Swindon railway station, drawing many of its members from Swindon works (and entitling the Brethren to privilege travel rates).



WBro David Shrimpton can often be found working on steam locomotives at the Toddington workshops of the Gloucestershire Warwickshire Steam Railway, including the oldest operational former Great Western Railway locomotive, no. 2807, designed by G J Churchward (also a Freemason) and built in 1905. It is currently being overhauled at Toddington.

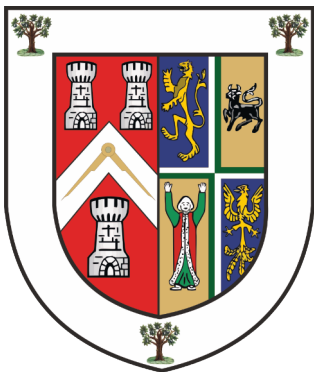
After this address, we "Called Back On" and concluded our business for the evening.

WORCESTERSHIRE FREEMASONS SUPPORT HAITI

Hundreds of families badly affected by the recent earthquake in Haiti will be able to recover from the tragedy and access clean, safe drinking water thanks to a grant of £25,000 from Worcestershire Freemasons and other Provinces to the Red Cross.

Following the earthquake, at least 650,000 people across Haiti are in need of emergency humanitarian assistance. The structural devastation has been enormous, especially in the cities of Jérémie and Les Cayes on the southern peninsula of the country, where around 53,000 homes have been destroyed and



a further 77,000 damaged, along with severe damage to major infrastructure like roads and bridges. Extensive damage to health facilities and worsening access to safe water and sanitation from mudslides and flooding has exacerbated the crisis.

Freemasonry, through the United Grand Lodge of England (UGLE) and Masonic Charitable Foundation (MCF), is responding to the emergency by providing support to the Red Cross Movement's work such as distributing relief goods, ensuring good water, sanitation and hygiene to prevent the outbreak of diseases as well as providing access to healthcare to those most in need.

The earthquake was centred 12km northeast of the town of Saint-Louis du Sud. Registering a magnitude of 7.2. Tremors were felt hundreds of kilometres away in Jamaica and Cuba. It is the strongest earthquake to hit the country since 2010, when a 7.0 magnitude earthquake devastated the capital city of Port-au-Prince, and the third major earthquake to hit the country in the past decade.

Alongside improving access to clean water, the Red Cross has reached over 40,000 people with blankets, tarpaulins, kitchen kits and hygiene kits to provide essential shelter and hygiene support.

Worcestershire Freemasons contributed to the grant, from the Masonic Charitable Foundation, which is funded by Freemasons, their families and friends, from across England and Wales.

RITUAL WHY ME?

What does ritual do to change a man? Is it any use in the real world? Surely, it's old stuff so there's nothing new or modern we can learn from it? They may seem funny questions. Surely, you may say, it's just an anarchic thing that we do in our lodge, but has no "real life" relevance. I hope to help you to dispel those thoughts.

Firstly, masonry ritual imposes regularity and order. All lodges, worldwide, have the same core. Yes, maybe they conduct Taylor's ritual instead of Emulation, but they do the same every time.

Rituals create order in life as well as in lodge. How many times in your home, work and life situation have you had to do the same task? Is your "ritual" worked out in advance, like the apprenticed tradesmen of old? Each job in the correct order, each next stage prepared for and then forgotten to allow full concentration on the task at hand. Can you imagine performing your part in an Initiation while thinking of the Third Degree ceremony! Rituals allow us to work unconsciously and concentrate on the finer points of our craft.

"But surely", I can hear you say, "the lodge ritual is different, it's acting and I'm not an actor". Very true! If you only look at it from the "what you have to do" perspective rather than the "what does it do for me" perspective. You see, some may say I'm a generous man, and, I suppose I am, as most of us are. But I am very selfish when it comes to my time. I realised my life was TIME, that's all I had. When my time runs out - guess what! So I became more selfish about my time and started to see what was happening in my world that was either giving me time or stealing time. I looked very carefully at the time I was "using up" to learn ritual and found, to my astonishment, that it all 100% benefitted me. Nobody else. Not my lodge, my family, my friends, none of them...only me.

How is that? I was taking myself to a quiet room, or space, or car and running through the words. While I was doing this I completely disconnected from the "real world". It was hard at times, but I was learning to dissociate from the stresses and strains of life, to become more objective, more detached. I had, even if only for a short period exercised self-discipline, one of the absolute key ingredients to success in life.

Did I get the ritual wrong at times? Of course I did, I'm not a trained actor am I. But I didn't beat myself up about it. I made a commitment to make it better next time and went and enjoyed the festive board. If someone tried to tell me that I was wrong I realised that this was a character flaw in them, not me. Mostly a pat on the back or a man hug was what was received. I had learnt that the ONLY opinion that matters in life is your own.

Don't get me wrong, I did some pretty good ritual too. Even then I learnt a valuable life lesson. I remember doing, if I may say so, a particularly good Second Degree Tracing Board and patting myself on the back. The very next meeting I'm doing it again. Instead of treating it as a new task, I slid the old one over by a month. Come the hour and the delivery was excellent, inside my brain the inner voice was

already congratulating myself, then I froze!!! Totally unable to speak any of the words of the last paragraph!! The prompter, who had put his book away, rushed to read the words to me. Most embarrassing moment, absolutely! My response was to understand that “pride comes before a fall”. I’d puffed myself up so much from my previous success that I failed to prepare properly. Did I die of shame, was I thrown out of the lodge. Of course not, the brethren patted my shoulder on the way to the great lodge wash-through “the festive board”. Another lesson learnt, “What’s the worst that can happen?”, now go fix it - I mean get it right. The actual words. Not my or your interpretation of what I, or you, think it should say. Not the “corrected text” to modern English, but the actual words. The blue book, and any lodge traditions incorporated, is the way it should be done. It is the standard that we aim for. We don’t lower the standard because it’s a bit hard this month. We rise to the challenge, allocate more time, make more effort and get it right! If, on the night, we fall short then we know what we need to do for next time.

Another life lesson learned! Work to get to the required standard. Remember, you are doing this on your own. Lodge of Instruction may help but it won’t help at all if you haven’t put in the effort.

At the end of all of this lonely hard work who benefits? Yes, you! You get the feeling of a challenge being met and conquered. Yes, you could have made excuses, yes, you could have made an excuse and missed lodge.

A word about that horrible little person inside your brain who will break out if you let him. I call him my “critical self”. You know, the small voice in your head that says “You idiot, you screwed that up” “You’ll never be able to do the Master’s work if you can’t even say “The lodge is probably tyled” (Yeah, another one of my masterpieces). I have learned over many year to shut the idiot up. It has translated into my life and my work. I never, ever criticise myself. Life lesson number no idea: there are enough people out there who will criticise you for free!

So please when looking at your ritual, can I ask you to do it with a selfish eye. Ask yourself what am I getting from this small giving? I would say enjoy it - but I don’t and I don’t think you will. It’s hard work stealing time for yourself. But the feeling of satisfaction when it goes well is like a fine wine.

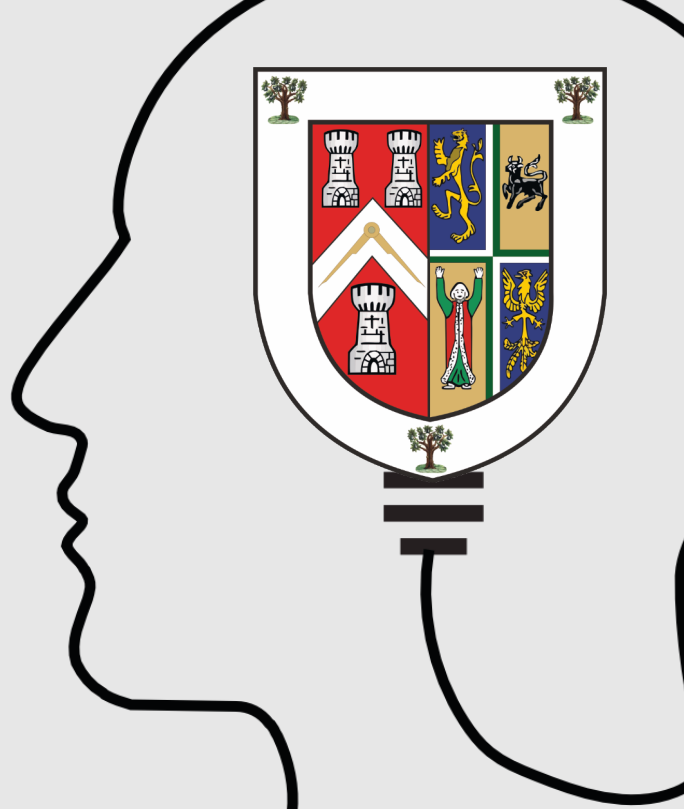

New for 2022 is that the competition is split into two categories. The first category being focused at widening knowledge before the Chair and the second category targeted at learnings beyond the Chair. More crucially, this approach follows the thoughts and recommendations of Grand Lodge.

The real premise for the Lecture Competition is that of drawing speakers from all levels within the province. No rank pulling here. Every Brother will have equal chance to shine. It is all about the relevance of the lecture material and the passion for sharing masonic insight, as opposed to demonstrating deep knowledge of dull or little-known "ancient cobweb covered" facts.

A final word from our Provincial Orator and Competition Host Kerry Parkes. Kerry is keen to continue the founding thoughts from the first Orator, the late Jeremy Mallin.
