THE BRETHREN YOU SIMPLY Can't do without

Mark Keepax explores the role of the Preceptor

One of the best experiences in Masonry is the joy of visiting a lodge where everything is well organised and runs smoothly to plan.

Ever wondered how a lodge manages to do this? Well in some instances, this is down to the work undertaken by this month's Unsung Heroes — the Lodge Preceptors. This article aims to shine a light on their often-overlooked work.

The Province of Worcestershire is blessed with wonderful Preceptors and the Rulers recognise their invaluable contribution.





All Preceptors ensure that a lodge operates within the governing principles set out by United Grand Lodge of England. The Preceptors remit however, covers way more than the mere formality of conformity. The dictionary definition being for a preceptor (from Latin, "praecepto") is a teacher responsible for upholding a precept, meaning a certain law or tradition.

So, what else does a Preceptor do? In essence, it breaks down into three distinct activities.

Firstly, that of giving counsel to the incoming new Master while assisting in formalising a well structured calendar of activity for him to preside over during his year in office. This involves careful guidance with recommending brethren for roles, advising on the promotions or advancements and help in identifying who will be undertaking the work.

The second set of activities extends way beyond the time they spend coaching and running the lodges of instruction to assist in mastering the proficiency of the formal ritual. It involves thought and action as to new members, resolving issues or concerns, while creating parties to support inter lodge visiting between fellow lodges.

The third element is to facilitate the building of true friendship between the brethren. It's this continued fraternity that is at the very heart of the craft. It is essential to masonry as it drives the allegiance that every brother feels for his respective mother lodge.

All these activities are framed against the backdrop of each lodge and conducted while upholding their rich traditions, pastimes and individual history.

Finally, the Preceptors also help the junior brethren to navigate the world that is not only Province but also the allied orders. It is through this shaping of thinking, careful advice on options or potential paths that ensures a lifetime of enjoyment for every brother.

This results in "Joined-Up Masonic Thinking", which is more than ensuring mere good sense as it's where collective intelligence flourishes. It's where we comprehend how interconnected we are, not only within our own lodge or allied orders, but with the Province and the wider world of masonry in the form of United Grand Lodge of England. Thus, strengthening masonry beyond the immediate boundary of the mother lodge room and securing its future.

This is a great epitaph for this month's unsung and simply irreplaceable hero, the Preceptor.

Defribillator Donation


Thanks to Worcestershire Freemasons, Droitwich AED has donated ten AEDs Automated External Defibrillators) to Worcestershire Police to help them provide lifesaving support should it be required. The donation was supported by the Freemasons charity, The Masonic Charitable Foundation.

This follows a presentation earlier this month of five units to Kidderminster Police and five units to Bromsgrove Police, also sponsored by Worcestershire Freemasons.


Peter Richards, Founder and Trustee of Droitwich AED, said: It is a sad fact that most people suffering an Out of Hospital Cardiac Arrest (OHCA) do not survive, currently only a rate of about 8.6%. This is mainly due to a lack of CPR and prompt defibrillation.

Defibrillators send an electric pulse or shock to the heart to restore a normal heartbeat. They prevent or correct an arrhythmia - an uneven heartbeat, that is too slow or fast. The lightweight battery operated portable device checks the heart's rhythm and sends a shock to the heart to restore normal rhythm.

Stephen Wyer, Head of Worcestershire Freemasons said: "I am delighted that we have been able to increase the number of defibrillators donated to Droitwich AED. They will help Police Officers and staff to provide lifesaving support if the unthinkable happens across Worcestershire."







75 and a double!



Last month saw not only the 75th anniversary meeting of The Sabrina Lodge No. 6595, but also the installation of WBro Jonathan Stubbs, into the chair of that lodge. He is, however, also currently in the chair of Sabrina Lodge No. 4158 (Shrewsbury) - the same name but pronounced slightly differently!; and the first time that this has occurred between the two lodges, for which, of course, a dispensation was required from both Provinces.

Visits between both lodges commenced in 1951. This collaboration, now in its 72nd year, is believed to be the longest such arrangement anywhere within the fraternity, and is recognised as such by UGLE. These visits are exchanged usually four times a year, and these pleasurable fraternal experiences were marked on the fiftieth anniversary in 2001, by an exchange of collarettes - of which Jonathan now needs to wear both of course!

The first section in the members pathway, titled "Plan" took the attendees through the two first Elements - Lodge Planning & Membership Action Plan.

The guiding principle behind these elements is to see the lodge move through the steps of Reflection, review, discussion and planning - all leading to the development of specific goals and the detailed plans to achieve them.

Attract

The second section, Attract, leads brethren through the stages of considering those opportunities to promote the lodge, be it in through events, community engagement online – or more specifically when presented with the situation of engaging with a non members. This section balances both the outward "marketing" plans of the lodge, together with the personal reflection required, to really consider and prepare an individual opinion and statement, ready for this engagement.

Additionally, it covers the steps involved in managing enquiries, interviewing and managing the expectations of new enquiries.

Engage

The Third section, Engage, now directs its focus to the support and engagement of newly initiated brethren. It guides us through the process of understanding the desires and aspirations of new brothers, their needs in the lodge, the support they should be given and how to encourage their participation within the Lodges activity.

It extends into consideration of the planned learning, the progression, the mentoring and further, covers the introduction of the Royal Arch and where appropriate - managing Migration to other provinces.

Retrieve

The fourth and final section in the Members' Pathway covers the options and techniques available to re-engaging inactive members and the unfortunate, but necessary, steps involved in reviewing and understanding the real reasons for losses.

It begins with an overview and detailed suggestions for tracking attendances and apologies, to first highlight any possible issues and near-future resignations. It guides us through the hopeful re-engagement of those brethren, with suggestions and techniques for the outreach and communication required.

Where the resignations cannot be prevented – it then proceeds through explanations of unattached masons, seeks to explore the real reasons for losses and works to establish and refine a process for truly understand and more importantly, learning from those loses.

In this month's edition of Provincial People, WBro Mark Keepax is in conversation with the Most Excellent Grand Superintendent for Royal Arch in Worcestershire, E Comp John M. Phenix.

The Pro Grand Master/Pro First Grand Principal, Most Excellent Companion Jonathan Spence, believes that the next regular step for a Master Mason should be to join the Royal Arch. In his seven year strategy for Freemasonry, he emphasises the close link between the Craft and Royal Arch. We are One Organisation! On the Masonic journey this is where we discover the beauty of Companionship, and learn about the discovery of the Lost Word at the Building of the Second Temple. Hence the very close connection between Craft Freemasonry and the Royal Arch - and nowhere is that connection stronger than that which exists in the Province of Worcestershire.

The Provincial Grand Chapter of Worcestershire is the body for all the Royal Arch Freemasons in Worcestershire. Based in Bromsgrove, 'the Province' supports nearly 800 companions across 33 Chapters, there being at least one Chapter at every meeting place.

M.E.G.S. John Phenix follows in the steps of some of the most famous and distinguished Companions of the Provincial Grand Chapter of Worcestershire. These include Excellent Companions Ted Hanson, Barrie Cooper, Richard Price and more latterly Colin Brown.

In these post Covid times E.Comp. John is seen as being the "right man at the right time" and this article attempts to illuminate a little more as to why. It also shares some insights as to the current activity, and future focus areas for the Royal Arch in Worcestershire - as well as giving a background to the man, companion and the importance of Exaltation.

Superintendent, welcome and can you tell us a little more about you and your Royal Arch background?

I am married to Sandra, live in Staffordshire and outside of Freemasonry my interests include walking, reading, music and spending time with my family and many friends.



My Holy Royal Arch career began when I was Exalted into Wigornia Chapter No. 4935 in 1991 and installed as MEZ in 1998, 2004 and 2009. I served as Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies from 2007-11, Prov. Grand Joshua 2014, Prov. Grand Haggai 2016-17 and was appointed Deputy Grand Superintendent in April 2018 and Most Excellent Grand Superintendent in April 2019.

Can you give some insight to the scope of the role of a M.E.G.S. in the Province?

Within 12 months of taking over the leadership the world dramatically changed as we went into Covid lockdown. I am now entering my fifth year as M.E.G.S. and during May 2021 I put into place a range of plans and actions to reinvent and reinvigorate Royal Arch in Worcestershire.

Perhaps my biggest personal contribution is to lead the "get back to normal" in Chapter. While recognising and appreciating that there is still concern around attending meetings, my team and I are attempting to help all of the Companions to get the fullest enjoyment out of the close friendship and caring nature that characterises the Order.

Prior to March 2020 the role was firmly established along the traditional lines of the Order, but now it is somewhat different, given the post Covid world that Royal Arch now operates in. I lead the Province with the help of a multi-disciplinary leadership team of talented Companions, who play an ever increasing and important role in helping me facilitate the support and cohesion to the 33 Chapters spread across the Province.

Moving forward can you share some insights as to your plans with regards to the work that will be undertaken in the next few years?

My thoughts and actions are focused on maintaining all the good things that we currently do in the Province. I am also looking to supplement that work by focusing on both 'Recruitment and Retention'. A number of initiatives are already underway by the team that are bearing fruit on this front. I am confident that these will gain momentum in the coming seasons.

Due to the Covid legacy our personal concerns can cause us to miss the beauty of what's continually unfolding right before our eyes at every meeting within Royal Arch. In essence I'm looking to broaden that awareness in the Province and of the caring nature of the Order.

The emphasis is to focus on the closeness of the Order, as the meetings are more intimate in size. They are presided over by a team order style of approach that shares the work. This makes the exploration of the ritual and meaning of the ceremonies easier to deliver. Which when set against a backdrop of the discovery element makes Royal Arch a dramatic and enlightening signature moment for every Companion.

Are you looking to emphasise any of the other unique elements of Royal Arch?

I will continue to reference the way Royal Arch extends the links and people who make up the Province of Worcestershire. Chapter is an ideal way to make more Masonic friends and to network in an efficient and broader manner across the Province. It's directly from this people and connections element of Royal Arch and from engaging in a friendly fraternal manner, that leads to a deeper understanding of who is a member of the Province.

It's also important not to overlook the enjoyment and uniqueness of the Festive Board. The style and manner has some interesting ritual surrounding it which is highly entertaining and enticing - specifically in respect of the dialogue and interactions held between the MEZ and Principal Sojourner.

Is there any Royal Arch Community Engagement work that you wish to highlight?

Within the Province of Worcestershire Royal Arch has its own separate Charity Fund. This is the vehicle that allows donations to be made to the smaller and often overlooked local charities. It enables a direct connection to be made with the Community of Worcestershire at a local level. The donating of smaller amounts of around £500 to multiple causes has a tangible and measurable direct impact to the cause that is supported.

For example these have included supporting such organisations as the Black Country Food Bank. Which have been both in terms of money in the form of a small donation, but also time given freely by the Companions to undertake supporting tasks such as help stacking shelves. It allows the facility to be more than just a donation, but to be an active and direct participant in supporting critical local community charitable needs, demands and wishes.

Finally, any closing comments that you would like to share with the Brethren?

It is an honour to have the opportunity to take on the role of Most Excellent Grand Superintendent, to lead the Royal Arch community within the Province of Worcestershire.

I feel that my team and I can do some wonderful work and have a genuine impact for Chapter. Together we can build a coherent organisation that reflects the principles of Wisdom, Peace, Strength, Concord, Beauty and Truth that are the very essence of Royal Arch Freemasonry. While making it easier and a natural step to join Royal Arch. These are challenging times and I look forward to the future.

Leather-clad biker Freemasons accelerate membership drive

For centuries the Freemasons have been regarded as a secretive society with ancient and arcane initiation ceremonies, whose adherents rarely discuss their membership.

But a surge in enquiries from people hoping to become initiated into the order is being spearheaded by a very unexpected group of Masons – leather-clad bikers.

Among the most high-profile and colourful of the Freemason's specialised lodges are those on two wheels. Their powerful machines and dramatic appearance along Britain's roads have helped drive up the number of enquiries about joining the Masons from 12,000 in 2020 to 18,000 in 2021.

There has also been a significant hike in the number of visitors to the website of The United Grand Lodge of England (UGLE), up from 65,000 in 2020 to 83,000 in 2021 – a rise of almost 30 per cent.

Among the most high-profile and colourful of the Freemason's specialised lodges are those on two wheels like the Buckinghamshire Motorcycle Lodge (* Ed - Lodge of progress in Worcestershire)

The Widows Sons Masonic Bikers Association (WSMBA) said: "Our chapters have helped to increase Masonic membership through our presence and visibility during public motorcycle events and rallies."

There are nearly a dozen motorbike lodges, gathering together to support charitable causes and raise awareness of the order among other bikers.

These include the Mike Hailwood Lodge in Warwickshire, named after the world champion Grand Prix motorcyclist and racing car driver killed in a road traffic accident in 1981; the Freewheelers Lodge in Lincolnshire; Lodge of Progress in Worcestershire; and the Chevaliers de Fer in Leicestershire and Rutland.

Their initiatives included distributing food to vulnerable members of the community during the Covid pandemic.

But the motorcycling Masons are at pains to point out that although they wear patches and other identifying regalia on their leathers they are not biker gangs.

"They are bound by the Masonic Book of Constitutions and are expected to represent the fraternity positively at all times," said the UGLE, the governing Masonic lodge for the majority of Freemasons in England, Wales and the Commonwealth.







lan Chandler, a former police detective and now provincial grandmaster of the Surrey Lodge, told The Telegraph: "Motorcycle lodges might be a long way from people's idea of the Freemasons, but it's the reality now."

Other specialised, trade- or hobby-based lodges include those for the armed forces, classic-car enthusiasts, farmers, golfers and rugby players.

Biking leathers have been added to the traditional garb of Freemasons. The growing interest in membership comes as the organisation urges existing Masons to be open about their affiliation and encourage others to join.

Jonathan Spence, Pro Grand Master of the UGLE, said: "We want to be a thriving membership organisation that people aspire to join.

"We have only recently been recording the number of enquiries given our new use of social media and this year was higher than last year, and we are extremely pleased with the volume we have received."

There is a waiting list of 6,000 people expecting to become members of UGLE, with more than 8,800 membership enquiries received in less than three months.

Mr Spence added: "We have been experiencing, post-Covid, an increasing trend of new joiners. We are certainly seeing the positive impact of converting enquiries into actual memberships.

Today's Freemasons insist the organisation's reputation for secrecy is far from the truth and is simply a hangover from the 1930s, when Freemasons were persecuted under the Nazis and maintained a low profile for self-preservation.

"We are not a secret society. We are about getting the best out of yourself as a human being while at the same time contributing to society at large," said Mr Spence.











Supreme Order of the Holy Royal Arch Province of Worcestershire

Well the last few months have been challenging for the Royal Arch.

On 10th January, we saw the Chapter of Round Table hand back its Warrant. Those present will remember, with great emotion, the addresses to the Chapter from E.Comp Rob Fernyhough and E.Comp Keith Prescott . Whilst the Chapter may no longer exist, it is pleasing to note that many of the Companions have found a new home to continue their journey in the Royal Arch.

On 8th February, Arter Chapter also handed back its Warrant. It is always sad to mark such an occasion, particularly when the Chapter can trace its roots back to 1919 - having enjoyed its Centenary meeting only four years ago in 2019, an evening remembered by many . A heartfelt address was given by E.Comp Greg Boughton, who ended by exhorting the Companions of the Chapter to move forward and join another Chapter. Those Companions of the Chapter present, will be meeting for a curry night in the not-too-distant future, to reminisce of the joy they have shared within the Chapter over the years.





On a brighter note, Vernon Chapter played host to several visitors on 20th January, when members of the Provincial Presentation Team delivered the Commentary on the Ceremony of Exaltation.
