Covid 19 Trials

The government is encouraging more people to join the thousands of volunteers and sign up to the NHS COVID-19 Vaccine Research Registry to help the NHS in the fight against coronavirus and ensure potential candidates work for everyone.

Over 100,000 people, including WBro Irving Horne who reminded us of this, have signed up for future COVID-19 vaccine clinical trials through the NHS COVID-19 vaccine research registry.

Volunteers are helping speed up efforts to find a safe and effective vaccine in the fight against coronavirus.

UK researchers urge more volunteers across all groups to sign-up, especially the over 65s and those from Black, Asian and minority ethnic backgrounds.





Freemasonry for a special interest.....

The history of Freemasonry is peppered with special interest lodges – indeed many were formed to meet very specific professional sectors.

Good examples include the school and university Lodges of which there are many, while others were constituted for the armed forces, the legal profession, banking, or for the London livery companies. In London there are others that have a university-based special interest – for example Argonauts Lodge was consecrated for university oarsmen.

Today there are specialist Lodges being formed to cater for leisure as well as professional interests throughout the UK. This can be an important way to attract new men to the fraternity. Examples include scouting, rugby, football, fishing, sailing, music, motorcycling, classic cars, motor racing – you name it!

And Worcestershire is no different, with the most recent specialist lodge to be consecrated (in 2018) being Permanent Way Lodge no. 9951 which attracts Brethren who have either a professional or leisure interest in railways, large and small.

In the Province topics catered for by special Lodges include the armed forces, air cadets, motorcyclists, Welsh and Scottish ex pats, builders, Morgan cars, history, Round Table, scouting and others.

WBro Mike Dykes, assistant PGM, comments: "We have a rich vein of specialist Lodges in the Province. Not only do they enable those already on the square with a particular interest to meet together but also attract men with the similar interests to join the Craft.

"They work extremely well and using social media, they can reach men who might otherwise not have considered joining Freemasonry. They also provide an opportunity to channel funds to charitable causes that reflect those specialisms that ordinarily might be overlooked by Freemasonry, and thus more widely underline the genuine benefits of Freemasonry in the eyes of the public."

In future editions of *Square News* we will take a look at some of these Lodges, why they were formed, what happens both socially and at meetings and what the future holds, and we'll start with Permanent Way Lodge. Maybe there is a special interest Lodge for you!
